After a good long growing season for most things, I have good stocks of, particularly, Narcissus which have been through their biennial rot and provided a lot of propagations. Please take advantage of the multiples where you get a good number of mainly smaller ones which are unlikely to flower next season but you will get a good start. N.B. I am still no longer able to send to EU countries.

Acis autumnalis var pulchella A Moroccan version of this excellent late summer/early autumn flowerer. It is quite distinct in the fact that the pedicels and bracts are green rather than maroon as in the type variety. Good in a raised bed in full sun. 3 for £2.50

Acis autumnalis var oporantha This is the one with the purple pedicel and ovary. 3 for £2.50

Allium callimischon var haemosticticum A delightful little autumn flowering onion. White flowers with lots of purple dots. It grows on cliffs in Crete. 3 for £4.00

Acis trichophyllum This lovely form with a slight pink shaded white flower won the Farrer Medal in London in 2014 and again in Kent Show earlier this year. It is easy to grow and if kept warm and undisturbed, it will flower nicely. 5 assorted sizes £3.50

Allium acuminatum ex NNS00-12. Dog Mtn, Columbia Gorge. Umbels of 10–40 brilliant rose-violet flowers on 10 cm stems on this tiny west coast onion from a moist maritime climate. The tepals are distinctively sharply pointed and out-curved. 3 for £4.00

Allium breviscarpum Kuh-e-Elwend, Hamadan, Iran. Nice white drumsticks on short stems over broad leaves. £4.00

Allium bollandieri From the Siskiyou mountains. Striking heads of violet purple stars on 15 cm stems. £2.50

Allium caesium JCA 17609 This beautiful grey-blue drumstick on 25cm stems was introduced by Jim Archibald from the Burguluk Gorge, Kazakhstan. Should be happy in the garden and is superb in a pot. £2.50

Allium cassium Pretty heads of white flowers fading pink on 10 cm stems. Seed raised from Syrian stock. 3 for £2.00

Allium egeroviae ex Kuh-e-Sabalan, NW Iran. Following the recent revision of the subgenus by Fritsch, this is a name change from what we called *A elburzense* in past lists. Rounded heads of pink and maroon flowers on short stems. £4.00

Allium insubricum Large mid pink nodding flowers in May. A must for the rock garden. 3 for £3.00

Allium narcissiflorum Heads of large soft pink flowers. A really good, well behaved, onion for the garden. 3 for £3.00

Allium oreophilum Deep pink seedlings of Kuramin Dwarf. A superb little onion. £2.50

Allium reuterianum Strange bronzy drumsticks on stiff stems in July. One for the alpine house. £2.50

Allium shelkovnikovii Deep pink drumsticks over a pair of broad glaucous leaves. Probably referable to *A akaka* but comes from Iran. £3.00

Bellevalia cyanopoda A delightful member of this interesting genus with white flowers and contrasting black anthers £3.00

Bellevalia flexuosa A Levantine species with blue flowers. £3.00

Biarum marmarisense A pure creamy white form with no pink. A multiple prize winner. £3.00

Biarum marmarisense ex Simi. We obtained this oddity from Jim & Jenny Archibald many years ago. It has flowers like the mainland form, but the leaves are smaller and more crinkled. I have a good stock level so: 3 for £3.00

Brimeura fastigiata A sweet little Corsican bulb for a pot and the late spring shows. Wide open white flowers on short stems in June. 3 for £2.50

Brodiaea coronaria ex NNS0764 from Columbia River Gorge in Washington State. Violet trumpets in June. £2.00

Caloscordum (Allium) neriniifolium A good bulb for the summer. It looks like a dwarf Nerine. £2.00

CHIONODOXA These are all really good plants which increase well in the open garden. Subsumed within *Scilla* by some authors.

Chionodoxa albescens A super little Cretan snow melt plant with creamy white flowers. 3 for £2.50

Chionodoxa cretica Rarely offered snow melt plant with racemes of pale blue flowers which open flat in mid March. 3 for £2.50

Chionodoxa forbesii The true plant which grows near Fethiye in SW Turkey. White centred dark blue flowers. 3 for £2.50

Chionodoxa nana A small Cretan species believed to be a high altitude form of *C cretica* with lots of pale blue flowers. 3 for £2.50

Colchicum baytopiorum from S Turkey. A neat dwarf Colchicum, large, open, pink flowers appear with the neat bright-green leaves in the autumn. A great one for the autumn shows. 3 mixed sizes for £4.00

Colchicum boissieri Fabulous pink goblets arise from twiggy corms. A great one for the autumn shows. Corms offered will take a couple of years before they flower. 3 mixed sizes for £4.00

Colchicum cupanii subsp glossiphyllum These are from a good cloning form of this pink miniature. They are small bulbs but will quickly fill up a pot so they are: 5 for £4.00

Colchicum davisii N of Haruniye. A very distinct Turkish species. The pink tessellated flowers appear in early autumn from the sausage-shaped horizontal corms. There is a huge patch of it in RBG Edinburgh and also in a raised bed in full sun in our west Wales garden so it is perfectly hardy outside. Special Offer 3 for: £2.50

Colchicum macrophyllum Sumptuous star-shaped tessellated flowers in the autumn. Large bulbs but still a couple of years from flowering. £4.00

Colchicum minutum Little pink flowers in early spring on this very local Taurus endemic. 5 for £4.00

Colchicum speciosum var album The striking pure white form of this great garden plant. Flowering sized bulbs £5.00

Colchicum soboliferum Lots of pale pink flowers with the leaves in Spring from twiglet-like corms. 3 assorted sizes for: £2.50

Corydalis section Leontocoides

The glory of the snow melt and excellent plants for a pot in the alpine house. It is not easy to obtain stock of this group since the tubers rarely divide and are self-sterile so hand pollination from at least two clones is necessary to get seed and seed collection is difficult. I offer mainly 3 - 4 year old seedlings which are not huge but should flower next year. Some are older and larger.

Corydalis ledebouriana This very widespread and variable species is much more attractive than the poor forms usually seen in cultivation. Good sized tubers but this form from western Tajikistan is dwarfer than most. £10.00

Corydalis maracandica A pale yellow or occasionally pink species from the Zeravshan Mountains south of Samarkand. £12.00

Corydalis seisumsiana	This seems to fit the description of this but Magnus Liden feels that it is just a nice form of the widespread <i>C. verticillaris</i> . Beautiful white, pink-lipped, flowers on a delightful dwarf plant from the snow melts of the Elburz.	£8.00
Corydalis seisumsiana	Iran, Mazandaran, S of Kalardasht. Keys out to this but looks rather different from the above in its more finely divided leaves and more airy habit.	£8.00
Corydalis tauricola	A pale pink species in section <i>Corydalis</i> from southern Turkey.	£3.00
Crocus goulimyi	A typical tall deep mauve form introduced by Jim Archibald from the Mani Peninsular.	£2.50
Crocus goulimyi	A dwarf form of the above.	£2.50
Crocus goulimyi var albus	A white form of the above.	£2.50
Fritillaria anhuiensis	Big pink tessellated flowers if you can persuade it to perform. Try rich well drained compost.	3 for £5.00
Fritillaria reuteri	I have a few seedlings of this fabulous snow melt Frit. Deep mahogany bells with a yellow tip.	3 for £7.00
Fritillaria thunbergii	Off-white flowers with green tessellation on tall stems. This stock flowers well and multiplies rapidly.	5 mid-sized bulbs for £3.50
Gagea sp	We grew this from seed introduced from the Co du Zad, in the Middle Atlas range of Morocco.	£2.00
Gagea fibrosa	My favourite and the largest flowers of the genus. You will receive what, misleadingly, looks like a dried up bit of rhizome but just plant it whole and water it in the autumn and it should perform for you.	£2.50

Galanthus alpinus	from Georgian Caucasus. Broad supervolute grey leaves hold the perfect single flower.	£10.00
Galanthus angustifolius	Like a narrow, glaucous-leaved <i>G. nivalis</i> . Emanating from the SW Caucasus.	3 for £10.00
Galanthus artjuschenkoae	Deep green applanate leaves and a single apical mark characterize this Armenian species.	£10.00
Galanthus buranus	We were extremely grateful to a friend who gave us seed of this newly described autumn flowerer. It is close to <i>G. plicatus</i> .	£20.00
Galanthus cilicicus	Three forms of this Christmas flowering snowdrop which are best kept in the greenhouse.	
‘Bowles Form’	This one has a larger inner mark than the others.	£8.00
‘Ray Cobb’s form’	More rounded flowers.	£8.00
ex Richad Nutt	A particularly elegant one.	£8.00
Galanthus elwesii var monostictus	RRW 11066 Flowering about Christmas time.	£6.00
Galanthus fosteri	We have a few spare bulbs of various stocks of this green-leaved species from the Levant.	£8.00
Galanthus gracilis	A very variable species. This form introduced from Western Turkey has broader leaves and bigger flowers than usual.	£10:00
Galanthus imperati WM1417	An interesting Neapolitan form of <i>G. nivalis</i> with some characters of <i>G. reginae-olgae</i> .	£8.00
Galanthus koenenianus x fosteri	This arose in a pot of seedlings of <i>G. koenenianus</i> and I separated it because it grew twice the size of the others, hence the proposed hybridity. It is much more vigorous than the seed parent.	£10.00
Galanthus lagodechianus	A bright green leaved one from mixed woodland near to Lagodechi itself, Georgia at 450 - 500m	3 for £5.00
Galanthus nivalis ‘Lovesgrove’	The best of two new poculiforms which I selected from my sister’s old property of this name near Aberystwyth.	£30.00
Galanthus nivalis ‘Ynys Môn’	The second selection is somewhat less perky but nevertheless is a fine plant. Named for Anglesey not Abbey!	£25.00
Galanthus peshmenii “Kastellorizo Form”	Rix4010 Vegetatively propagated bulbs of the original introduction of the form from the island of the same name by Martyn Rix. In this, the AM clone, the leaves appear with the flowers. These are too small to flower this autumn so are only:	3 for £10.00

‘Corrin’	Raised by me and named after our daughter. A reverse poculiform with prostrate glaucous leaves and much admired for its distinct poise.	£40.00
‘Diggory’	A <i>G. plicatus</i> type with flowers the texture of seersucker. The outer segments incurve to resemble a whisky still.	£10.00
‘Emerald Isle’	An unusual <i>G. ikariae</i> form with solid green inner and green marks on the outers.	£15.00
‘Fieldgate Prelude’	A Colin Mason raising from G. ‘Mrs MacNamara’ with bottle green inner segments.	£10.00
‘Godfrey Owen’	A perfect single snowdrop with 6 outer petals.	£20.00

‘Peter Gatehouse’	A late autumn-flowering <i>G. elwesii</i> . Short and perky with a pale, olive green inner mark.	£10.00

Gynandiris sisyrinchium A Syrian introduction which comes into its own in Late April when the evanescent flowers open at lunch time on sunny days to be followed the next sunny day by another batch. Lovely and should grow outside in a sunny place. 3 for £4.00

Habranthus martinezii	Big pink flowers on 10cm stems in response to the first watering after summer dormancy. The later you water, the later the flowers. Flowering size bulbs.	£2.50
Hesperantha rosea	We received it under this name. Kew Checklist now calls it <i>Geissorhiza heterostyla</i> subsp. <i>rosea</i> but our plant doesn't have the correct style. Nevertheless it is an easy going little bulb for the raised bed. It flowers in July and seeds about mildly.	3 for £4.00
Hyacinthella acutiloba	Lovely blue flowers over a pair of broad glaucous leaves.	£3.00
Hyacinthella heldreichii	A beautiful dark blue-flowered form from the central Cilician Taurus.	5 mixed sizes for £4.00
Hyacinthella hispida	Hairy foliage is a rarity in bulbs and this little blue flowered hyacinth could do with a trip to the barber!	£3.00
Hyacinthella lazulina	Little mid blue flowers, with no visible pedicel, pose up the stem.	£2.00
Hyacinthella nervosa	From an Archibald collection of this local, edge of desert, species from south east Turkey.	£3.00
Hyacinthella venusta	ex JKP9919 Fabulous blue, white-centred, flowers with contrasting black anthers.	£3.00
Hyacinthoides lingulata	This flowers at autumn show time and has won one Farrer Medal and two Certificates of Merit.	3 for £4.00
Hyacinthoides mauritanica (vincentina)	A lovely little May-flowering bulb from the Iberian peninsular.	3 for £4.00
Hyacinthus litwinowii	Grey-blue flowers and triangular glaucous leaves on this rare species.	£5.00
Ipheion dialystemon	Bright yellow flowers with brown stripes on the outside. Flowers over a long period in early spring. Dried bulbs may remain dormant for the first season so I supply bulbs which have been kept slightly moist so hopefully these will not.	3 for £3.50
Ipheion 'Jessie'	A beautiful seedling of 'Rolf Fiedler' with even darker flowers.	3 for £2.00
Iris arenaria	We have been growing this for nearly 40 years and never offered it. It is a rhizomatous species whose evanescent yellow flowers open on 3cm tubes from midday. Grow in sandy compost and repot when dormant in the winter.	£5.00
Iris attica yellow form	A tiny pogon Iris from Greece. Easy to grow and flower.	£3.00
Iris goniocarpa	A Chinese species with 10 cm grassy foliage and a succession of 3 cm lilac flowers. It grows happily outside with us in a sunny peat bed.	£2.00
Iris lutescens	A lovely 15cm tall, bearded iris with blue flowers.	£2.50
Iris minutoaurea	This has hung on with us in a peaty trough for 4 decades but flowered rarely. It is extremely rare in cultivation so this may well be the only stock in the UK. Please will someone try and coax to flower reliably. Fabulous little yellow flowers with brown marks.	£6.00
Iris reichenbachii	Large, purple or yellow flowers on short stems. Good in the rock garden or a pot. <u>Please choose colour!</u>	£3.00
Iris suaveolens 'Purple form'	A real dwarf of 10cm max. and a great plant for a trough or rock garden.	£3.00
Iris timofejewii	Bob's favourite baby bearded Iris. Big deep blue flowers on 10cm stems. Dagastan, Eastern Caucasus.	£5.00
Ixia paniculata	Branched racemes of stunning peachy blooms with a long tube in early summer. A most spectacular plant in our bulb house in early summer which has escaped and now flowers well in the garden too.	Special Offer: 3 for £4.00

MUSCARI is a much-underrated genus of easily grown bulbs. Please do not be put off by the weedy form of *M neglecta* which we all seem to inherit with every garden! These are all excellent and well behaved plants.

Muscari anatolicum	The limestone pavement on the Zigarettepesi Pass is full of this tiny grape hyacinth with deep blackish blue flowers with pale blue sterile flowers. Only 5cm tall in the wild.	£2.50
Muscari anatolicum	We found a very dwarf <i>Muscari</i> near Lake Beysehir which keys to this but the sterile flowers are pink.	£2.50
Muscari armeniacum 'Gül'	'Gül' is Turkish for 'rose' which describes the flush on the otherwise white flowers. We have selected seedlings over several generations from our original introduction from the Taurus mountains and they now come consistently true.	£3.00
Muscari azureum	Beautiful and choice. Pale blue flowers on this snow melt bulb from Göksun, S Turkey.	3 for £2.50
Muscari commutatum	Distinctive blackish violet flowers in a dense raceme on 15 cm stems.	3 for £2.50
Muscari commutatum	A lilac coloured form of the above.	3 for £2.50
Muscari commutatum var album	I have a few offsets.	3 for £3.50
Muscari discolor	ex JCA17760 W of Urfa. Blackish purple open bells with a superb white mouth. Probably needs a cold winter to flower well.	£2.50
Muscari inconstictum	Eye catching electric blue and black flowers. A choice and striking plant from the Levant.	£2.50
Muscari inconstictum	We were given bulbs of this little beauty when we coveted it at South Wales Show and it has increased well for us. It is a tiny electric blue species which is surely a distinct species from those found on the Levant mainland. Ex Cyprus	3 for £4.00
Muscari pallens	This is the true plant from rock ledges on the northern side of the Caucasus. Lovely palest blue flowers on contrasting purple-red stems. The last to flower and very distinct.	3 for £3.50
Muscari sivrihisardaghlarensis	Deep blue flowers related to <i>M neglectum</i> but not at all invasive. Worth growing just so that you can proudly pronounce the name!	3 for £3.50

NARCISSUS *Narcissus* nomenclature is very confused where Kew Checklist, RHS Narcissus Species Register and the recent Michael Salmon book do not agree so we have done our best to describe what is on offer. Please note that many of those sold in multiples are small bulbs which may not flower for a couple of seasons.

Narcissus asturiensis	The tiniest of the trumpet daffs. We grow it in ericaceous compost for the best results. It needs to be kept cool in summer.	3 for £5.00
Narcissus albidus	These large white-flowered hoop petticoats from the Middle Atlas are a good example of the taxonomic nightmare! Kew Checklist uses <i>N albicans</i> , the Narcissus Register has it as <i>N romieuxii var albidus</i> (which it is quite unlike!).	
Narcissus albidus	An old ABS collection with large creamy white flowers.	3 for £4.00
Narcissus albidus	(4822) Our own introduction from near Afourer, High Atlas range.	3 for £4.00
Narcissus albidus	ex JWB8927A. An early flowering form of this large white hoop petticoat.	3 for £4.00
Narcissus albidus SF110	Huge white trumpets on this classic show plant which clones up well.	3 for £5.00
Narcissus albidus	An early one with narrower creamy white funnels.	£2.00
Narcissus albidus var occidentalis	From the vast cirque of Imouzer des ita Outanane in the western Atlas.	3 for £5.00
Narcissus atlanticus	Primrose flowers on this narrow endemic in a gorge in the high Atlas. Rarely offered.	£6.00
Narcissus bulbocodium	An easy going hoop petticoat for the garden. Yellow trumpets with a green striped tube.	3 for £2.50
Narcissus bulbocodium var filifolius	A nice big-flowered form with deep yellow flowers and narrow leaves.	3 for £2.50
Narcissus bulbocodium var pallidus	(Form A) A mid yellow, early flowerer from Asni Rocks, south of Marrakesh.	3 for £3.50
Narcissus bulbocodium var pallidus	(Form B) Greeny yellow fading to cream flowers in January.	3 for £3.50
Narcissus bulbocodium var praecox	An early flowering hoop petticoat from the High Atlas with sumptuous big mid yellow flowers.	3 for £4.00
Narcissus bulbocodium var praecox paucinerveus	M8418 This is what the plant keys to according to Maire who made extensive studies of Moroccan Narcissi. Although only a form of <i>N bulbocodium</i> or more likely <i>N romieuxii</i> , it is quite distinct. One of the earliest bulbocodiums to flower, often in January. The flowers open just above ground level and the stems gradually increase to 10-15cm. From near Ifrane growing at 1500m.	3 for £2.50
Narcissus bulbocodium tenuifolius x triandrus	My own cross which is very vigorous but not really distinct enough from other similar crosses to merit a clonal name. Like a large 'Solveig's Song'.	3 for £5.00
Narcissus bulbocodium var viriditubus	Big dark yellow flowers.	£2.00

Narcissus cantabricus	Merged in with <i>N cantabricus</i> by most authors (others refer it as <i>N albidus</i> or subsp <i>eualbidus</i>) but quite distinct with its up-facing white flowered with scattered anthers on 10cm stems, Rif mountains, Morocco.	5 for £6.00
Narcissus cantabricus	SF255 ex Marble Mountain. Stunning white flowers.	3 for £3.50
Narcissus cuatrecasasii	A little member of subgenus <i>Apodanthe</i> which peers out from rock ledges in southern Spain. Easy and a good show plant.	3 for £4.50
Narcissus fernandesii	Seed raised from correctly identified wild stock. Lots of sweetly scented flowers with an undivided cup and a swept back corolla.	3 flowering sized bulbs for £3.50
Narcissus gaditanus	ex Algarve. A tiny little jonquil from hot places on the Iberian peninsular.	5 for £4.00
Narcissus x incurvicervicus	Sierra Madrona. The natural hybrid between <i>N fernandesii</i> and <i>triandrus</i> . Lovely and easy.	£2.50
Narcissus jacetanus	A dwarf trumpet daff for a trough or rock garden. It makes a good show plant.	£2.50
Narcissus jonquilla var henriquesii	A variety with a longer straighter corona. 2-3 flowers on each 25cm tall stem.	5 flowering sized bulbs for £2.50
Narcissus obesus	SW Portugal. The Portuguese coastal chasmophyte. Big cup-shaped hoop-petticoats over prostrate foliage.	3 for £4.00
Narcissus obesus ‘Lee Martin’	Stock of Lee's fabulous multi-Farrer plant.	3 for £5.00
Narcissus perez-chiscanoi	Ex JWB 87-08. Montes de Toledo near Almaden, Central Spain.. A yellow trumpet daffodil with short twisted, perianth-segments. It is proving a good garden-plant in the UK so far.	£2.50
Narcissus praelongus	From Sierra d'Estrela. Closely related to, and probably just a form of, <i>N assoanus</i> .	3 for £4.00
Narcissus romieuxii ‘Julia Jane’	I guarantee that this is the true plant as named by Jim Archibald, given to us by Jenny from their collection. Most of that in the trade under this name is nothing like this and is wrong! It should have a sumptuous frilly corona which forms a flat disc with reflexed margins, within 3 days of opening.	£5.00
Narcissus romieuxii	A good dark yellow form from Fred Hunt.	5 for £4.00
Narcissus romieuxii	from wind eroded rocks near Ain Leuh, Middle Atlas range.	5 for £4.00
